The four-day extravaganza (see box for complete itinerary) will begin a jugalbandi by Ronu Majumdar and troupe, a Carnatic vocal recital by Abhishek Raghuram and troupe, "Silapadhikaram – A Grand Dance Drama," and the tale of "Anklet", among others.

Veena exponent Dr Suma Sudhindra, remarks, "I am eagerly anticipating the jugalbandi with the country's renowned flutist, Pandit Majumdar. We hope the audience will deeply connect with our musical fusion."

Rama Vaidhyanathan, who will be part of "Pratibodhana - The Awakening", expresses her excitement, stating, "I am eagerly looking forward to performing at BIAF 2024. My show 'Pratibodhana' is a dance performance that explores various interpretations of 'awakening.' The maverick vocalist, hailing from Belgaum, forged a path in Hindustani classical music, defying tradition with his original musical style. Born Shivputra Komkali, the virtuoso, passed away 25 years ago on January 12, 1992.
